INFORMAL FALLACIES

1. Ambiguity

('America is a 'Christian Nation'!")

2. Equivocation

(evidence that the people are a 'Christian nation' is offered to argue the claim that the national government was founded as a 'Christian nation')

3. Hasty Generalization

(evidence that some Founders were orthodox Christians supporting the conclusion : "All Founders were orthodox Christians")

4. False Dichotomy

("The Founders were either atheists-secularists or orthodox Christians" – but obviously they were not atheists-secularists, thus they must have been orthodox Christians)

5. False Cause

(The Colonies were Christian, thus the national government that followed was Christian)

6. Appeal to Emotions

[positive or negative]

7. Appeal to the Crowd / 'Bandwagon Appeal'

(group-feeling and desire for group belonging to group-thinking / group-belief)

8. Appeal to Tradition

("Until recently, tradition shows that America was founded as a Christian nation.")

9. Straw Man

10. Red Herring

(""Separation of church and state' is NOT found in the text of the U.S. Constitution, but 'separation of church and state' IS in the constitution of the communist USSR!")

11. Ad hominem

[personal]

("Whitten you are a liberal! -Whitten you are a heretic!")

[circumstantial]

("What would you expect? this essay was published by that stupid, evil organization -

Americans United for Separation of Church and State!")

(What would you expect? - Whitten went to Baylor - that un-Christian and un-American school!)

12. Appeal to Force

("If you believe that, you cannot teach Sunday School at our church!")
